Many people believe that Muslim women are forced to wear the Hijab and are forced to wear modest clothing and cannot do anything without a man. Those who do not wear modest clothing are seen as outcasts

When people see a Muslim woman in a Hijab, they instantly know that she's part of Islam and I love that I represent Islam by wearing it. Some people think that Islam is strict because we are not allowed to drink, eat pork, and wear clothes that show the shape of your body. I can see where they are coming from, and it makes sense. Because in American culture, drinking is so normalized and drinking alcohol has often been associated with having fun. To give you an idea, The world cup that was hosted in Qatar said that alcohol was prohibited. Which makes sense because it's a Muslim country. It taught me that we don't need alcohol to feel joy and happiness in our life. And that we can get joy from other things in life.

People have always told me during the summer, “Don’t you get hot in that.” And I would always reply, “No.” Because I really didn’t get hot in it, the hijab is very thin. But sometimes I feel jealous when it’s summer and I see girls my age with crop tops and shorts on and their hair out. And when going to the lake or beach, seeing girls with bikinis on while I wear a burkini swimsuit. Just imagine it being a scorching hot day and seeing a girl covered from head to toe.
